Good Day to All!

Today we celebrate the feast of Christ the King of the Universe. The Gospel tells us of the Corporal Works of Mercy. They are very important to Jesus, for He repeats them four times. There are many stories about the Corporal Works of Mercy. Let me share one.

Anne Marie Schmidt lived in Czechoslovakia under Nazi persecution and later Russian battlefront. Her story is inspiring, but today I want to focus on a Pre-World War II story. She tells of the night her parents were having a gala dinner party that included several dignitaries. Early in the festivities, a servant whispered to her mother that Christ was at the door. Immediately her mother excused herself.

Curious, young Anne Marie followed. She found her mother on the ground in her elegant gown, washing the infected, dirt-caked feet of the filthiest. smelliest man Anne Marie had ever seen. Furthermore, she was shocked when her mother instructed a servant to bathe, clothe, and find a bed for their guest, and invite him to dinner. On the way back inside, Anne Marie challenged her mother's invitation to the poor beggar. Her mother cried, saying she thought she had failed as a mother if her daughter did not recognize Christ in the poor. The next morning, a curious Anne Marie looked for the man, who had not come to dinner. She found his bed unused and a single rose on the pillow. She learned that to serve the poor is to serve Christ.

If we are to be good subjects in Christ's Kingdom, we need to see Christ in each other. Christ showed the way. He embraced the leper and ate with sinners and outcasts, rich and poor. He had pity on the widow of Nain and welcomed the little children. Can we do any less?







Updated Guidelines for Regarding MDHHS Emergency Order MCL 333.2253

On November 15, Michigan's Department of Health and Human Services issued an updated Emergency Order that impacts all regions in Michigan. The following updates are effective November 18 through December 8:

Liturgical Gatherings

Further guidance for liturgical gatherings will be forthcoming, however the current protocols for all liturgies remain in place, particularly the requirements for all to wear a mask; social distancing; proper sanitization of the parish; and capacity must not exceed the number of persons that can safely be accommodated while maintaining social distancing. Of note, Funeral Masses in our parish churches may also continue to take place in the same manner, so long as the protocols for liturgical celebrations remain in place.

Schools

Our diocesan Office of Catholic Schools published guidelines which can be found on the diocesan website. In summary: preschool, elementary and middle school classes will continue in-person, and High School classes will transition to virtual learning November 18 through December 8. Extracurriculars and school-sponsored sports for all grade levels are immediately suspended, and there will be no athletic practices or competitions until the order expires. After School Care will continue to be offered while school is in session.

Faith Formation

Faith Formation in our parishes should continue to follow our diocesan school guidelines. With this in mind, preschool, elementary and middle school Faith Formation will continue in-person. Adult classes and High School classes and activities (youth group, etc.) will take place online beginning November 18. Fr. Nicholas Cooper, Interim Director of Faith Formation, will be sending an additional message to Faith Formation leaders in this regard.

Non-Liturgical Gatherings

With the exception of parish Faith Formation, indoor gatherings are not permitted during this time. These indoor gatherings would include meetings (parish and outside groups); fundraisers, such as craft shows; fellowship and meals; or use of the parish hall for family reunions, etc. *Outdoor* gatherings are permitted with capacity limitations, which can be found on the MDHHS website.
